2 Practical Assessment

Assessment Type

Practical Assessment

Task Description

This assessment has 2 parts - Part A In-Class Presentation (10%) and Part B In-Class Test (20%).

Part A In-Class Presentation (10%)

This is a group assessment - 2 students per group. The group submits a written report on a chosen presentation topic and Powerpoint slides for the presentation. Each student in the group will receive the same mark for the report (5%) but a separate mark for the presentation (5%). Your presentation should be organised so each student speaks for approximately the same duration. Word length for the report - 1500 words. Your presentation should take approximately 10-15 minutes. You should refer to at least 5 sources in preparing your report and presentation using APA referencing. Presentation topics and rubric will be available on Moodle. Submit your report and slides to your lecturer. Arrangements for distance students will be advised.

Part B In-Class Test (20%)

This is a 1-hour in-class test to be held during your normal lecture/workshop in Week 9. Short-answer questions will be based on material covered in Weeks 1-5. Students may refer to lecture notes and the eBook, but not other Internet resources. Arrangements for distance students will be advised.
