Task Description

Students will choose one (1) of three (3) provided case studies to undertake a generic (International Classification of Functioning, Disability and Health; ICF) and discipline specific analysis.

First, students will demonstrate their knowledge and ability to implement the ICF. Subsequently, students will identify the multi-disciplinary team pertinent to this case, and explore their (and one other) discipline's scope of practice, and discuss how their Allied Health discipline might assist the client.
