General Information

Overview

In this unit, you will learn about construction planning and scheduling, the role of the construction planning consultant, developing an initial job using labour, materials, plant and time units from design documentation, estimates and/or Bills of Quantities, using construction planning methodologies and tools including bar charts, critical path methods, line of balance, cash flow projections, least cost optimisation and flagging approval. Detail schedules for sub-contract activity including analysis of assembly and production, bar charts and critical pattern analysis, line of balances, least cost optimisation, multiple activity chart planning and control, expediting contracts. Selected scheduling and network analysis computer software will be examined. Students who have successfully completed BLCN12037 should not enrol in this unit.


