Overview

Business Research Project is an independent 12cp research unit. You will identify and conduct supervised independent research in an appropriate area of interest of relevance to your specific Masters Course. You will identify the topic, review existing literature, set the research questions, define the methodology, collect and analyse the data, and write up the final business project. The emphasis in this unit is on self-development under supervision of an appropriate faculty member.



Task Description

BUSN20021 requires the production of a mini-thesis. This project should be developed from the knowledge that you have gained during your Masters work, in consultation with your chosen supervisor. Your thesis will be approximately 6,000 words in length, and require some original research, using either primary or secondary research, or potentially a structured, systematic or integrated literature review.

Assessment Criteria

Thesis Examination Criteria

You will be assessed on the following areas

- does the student show sufficient familiarity with, and understanding and critical appraisal of, the relevant literature?
- does the thesis provide a sufficiently comprehensive investigation of the topic?
- are the research methods and techniques adopted appropriate to the subject matter and are they properly justified and applied?
- are the research results suitably set out and accompanied by adequate exposition and interpretation?

- are conclusions and implications appropriately developed and clearly linked to the nature and content of the research framework and findings?
- has/have the research question(s) been tested or explored according to disciplinary norms?
- is the quality of communication and general presentation of the thesis of a suitably high standard?
- does the thesis as a whole constitute a substantive original contribution to knowledge in the subject area with which it deals?

Examiners are also asked to consider the following attributes.

- demonstrates authority in the field and shows evidence of knowledge
- demonstrate a thorough grasp of the appropriate methodological techniques and an awareness of their limitations
- make a contribution to knowledge demonstrate the student's ability to communicate research findings effectively in the professional arena and in an international context
- demonstrate an understanding of, and commitment to, research ethics and integrity.
