Overview

In this unit you will develop fundamental acting techniques including stagecraft, mime and improvisational theatre. Stagecraft involves the technical aspects and terminology of the theatre. Mime encourages actors to think about their bodies and how they can act without speech. Improvisational theatre has a long history, and provides several key techniques necessary to actors.

Task Description

Demonstrate a combined application of Stagecraft, Mime & Improvisation. Performance One is a confluence of applied stagecraft, mime and improvisation skills in rehearsing, developing and performing an initial first year University Production to an invited audience. It is the major assessment for the Unit CART11007 Beginning the Story, and it is a proof of concept demonstration of the applied skills and knowledge that the students have developed in Term One. Students will be required to deliver a directed and collaboratively developed performance that demonstrates their developed skills in stagecraft, mime and narrative storytelling, developed through studio application of improvisation, mime and rehearsal techniques.
