You will be required to choose and learn two monologues in consultation with your lecturer. These monologues will potentially be presented to a simulated audition panel, and one will be filmed and submitted. You are required to apply and demonstrate your advanced acting skills and techniques such as script analysis, voice, and stagecraft. You are required to attend at least 90% of scheduled classes and rehearsals via zoom or in studio. If you fall below 90% in attendance you must provide formal evidence for absence as per University policy, or you may be graded as AF (Absent Fail).
