### **Assessment Criteria**

The research component will be assessed on the quality of the sources used, the student's ability to select sources relevant to the task, and the ability to summarise the outcomes of the research in a concise and structured way. Arguments addressing the research questions or problems must be logically ordered and structured and focused on the issues. The YouTube video presentation must endeavour to present the outcomes of the research in a user-friendly way suitable for understanding by a client who has no knowledge of the law. This aspect of the presentation will be the primary focus of marking the video, not just the legal content. A more detailed rubric will be provided with the assignment specification.
