Assessment Type

Presentation and Written Assessment

Task Description

This is a milestone that enables the student to gain some formal feedback that will enable them to refine and develop the project. Students are expected to prepare a two page (up to 800 word + references) brief describing their progress, and have an in-person or Zoom meeting with their supervisor/lecturer to discuss their progress.

Research value, innovation: degree to which the project reflects an advancement on current knowledge and/or practice.

Execution: the degree to which the student has demonstrated knowledge and skill in using research techniques to deliver the project.

Critical thinking: the degree to which the project represents critical evaluation of both the sources, the data, and the success of the project (including research limitations)

Communication: quality, accuracy and clarity of both the verbal and visual (e.g. charts/tables/figures) elements of the research report.
