Part 1

Clinical Nursing Practice 1 involves 120 hours clinical placement.

- You are required to complete the ANSAT and time sheet during placement. Upload the completed ANSAT to Moodle within 7 days of completing placement.

Part 2

1500+/-10% word reflection

- Complete a reflection on a learning opportunity that you experienced on clinical placement.
- Using Gibb's reflective cycle, choose to reflect on one event or several depending on your preference and your clinical experience.
- You may write in first person and referencing is not required as it is your thoughts and feelings that are being discussed. If you use a direct quote or wish to support your knowledge with literature a reference will be required.

1500 +/- 10% words is the limit for your reflection. Marking criteria is below:
