I found on placement, one week with the AINs is plenty enough. A week with the RNs as well would be much more beneficial than only one day.

#### Recommendation

Placement dates rely on facility availability so outside of CQUniversity control. As the majority of placements are in Aged Care Facilities, the availability of RNs on duty does not allow more time for one on one with students. A registered nurse facilitator is available on site and students are able to contact their unit coordinators if they have any questions during their placement.
