- Essay format includes an introduction, body paragraphs and conclusion.
- Use double line spacing, single page and Times New Roman with 12 font.
- A Reference list that adheres to APA presentation guidelines and indicates that you have read widely. Start on a separate page.
- Inclusion of evidence-based clinical guidelines accessed from websites is acceptable.
- It is preferred you use academic peer-reviewed articles/ journals. NB: Journal articles used must be less than 5 years old and textbooks less than 10 years old.
- **Please save/upload your file in either a Word format (.doc or .docx) or in a basic text format (for example, .rtf), so that I can open the files in Word.**
